What does your organisation do?

Berwick Literary Festival (BLF) was launched in 2014 with the Town Council's support to add an extra dimension to the town's autumn season of the Film & Media Arts and Food Festivals, and Heritage Open Days. Another cultural event adds to the attraction of Berwick for tourism and economic regeneration; offers entertainment and interest to local residents; encourages locally based writers, important in the context of the current Creative and Cultural Zone project; and from the outset it offered enrichment activities to the town's schools at all levels. These aims align with the first two ambitions of the Council's own Mission Statement and of its published Guidelines for grants.

The Festival operates in two ways during one week every October: its charitable activities support schools; and it runs a programme of speaker events covering a widely diverse range of subjects and speakers relevant to the local area but also bringing writers and speakers of national and international reputation to Berwick.

The Festival will run from 7-13 October 2024: the first four days deliver free enrichment activities to all schools in the Berwick Partnership; the speaker programme will run through the week, with the bulk of activity over the weekend of 11/12/13th, with live events in town centre venues.

The organisational effort applied to schools vs speaker events is roughly 50:50 of Festival resources (which are almost entirely volunteers).

Preparations for the 2024 Festival are well under way. As well as our usual Festival week in October, we have offered or are offering a number of one-off events, including marking the 30th Anniversary of the Rwanda Genocide, a visit from Michael Palin to celebrate Bridge 400, as well as support for the Berwick Parish Church Trust event for Bridge 400, support for The Maltings' programme relating to the Spoken Word, and the possibility of a visit from another national figure from the world of entertainment and broadcasting who has just published an autobiography.

The Schools' programme is already taking shape, with a new 'Living Heritage' project in partnership with Berwick Academy being launched in the summer term; and visits from a well-known children's author, a young, highly visible Scottish poet and a journalist talking about the history of Artificial Intelligence.

The main festival programme will take seriously our byline "Celebrating Words: Written, Spoken, Performed", and will explore the theme *Bridging the Divide*, in honour of Bridge 400. It is a theme rich with relevance and interest in almost every genre and discipline of writing. We will see a rich mix of famous faces, popular authors, and challenging academics gracing the stages of our venues - which include The Maltings, the Guildhall and a number of church premises. The full programme will be available from Thursday 1 August, and we will ensure that all councillors receive a copy.

Why is it needed? (include details of any research you have carried out to identify the need and describe any specific benefits for the people of Berwick, Tweedmouth and Spittal)

The Festival as a whole brings significant enrichment to the town. Our programme is developing. Our partnerships with other organisations in the town - and notably in 2023/4, with The Maltings and with the Bridge 400 celebrations - are a high priority. Our audiences are growing. Active consideration is being given to how to broaden the appeal of the Festival to more residents, including more 'popular' writers, more performance and more genres of writing. Local businesses attest to the significantly higher numbers of people visiting the town over the Festival weekend. We are working with BEA and U3A, and others, to promote continuing programmes through the year that are prompted by festival guests.

The schools, at all levels, consistently commend the Festival for the quality of the programme, that it is carefully tied to their curriculum needs, and that it is delivered free of charge. Around 900 children benefit.

How will you measure the success of your project?

All schools are requested to provide feedback both on the impact of the programme and the efficiency of the Literary Festival in delivering the programme. Feedback from the 2023 programme is attached as an annexe to this application. Success is measured immediately by audience numbers and oral feedback. This year we will have other measures, such as take-up for post-festival programmes.
